COLLECTIVE PURPOSE

Collective Purpose expresses its deepest and most heartfelt gratitude to all former staff, students, volunteers and Board Members for their hard work and commitment and wish them all the best in future endeavours! We warmly welcome all new community members and look forward to continuing to work together!

Since our official launch in July 2016 by founding partners WayAhead- Mental Health Association NSW, BEING, and Mental Health Carers NSW, Collective Purpose has experienced an incredible period of expansion and growth across the breadth of our activities. In November 2016, we welcomed our first new permanent addition to the Collective Purpose community, International Social Service Australia (NSW Office). ISS joined with a team of roughly ten staff, taking up seven full time equivalent desks. In April 2017, we grew again as we welcomed SMART Recovery Australia's team of six. Both organisations have brought fresh faces and a rich diversity of skills and experience, becoming integral and valued members of the Collective Purpose community.

In November 2016, we entered into a contract with a new IT support service provider and made the transition to Ensys who have proved to be a valuable partner in supporting Collective Purpose's technology system. In other digital news, in December 2017, Collective Purpose launched its brand-new website, complete with online booking system. We have experienced dramatic increase in online engagement with the website, as well as on our social media platforms. This means we are reaching wider audiences than ever before, this is reflected in our growing and increasingly diverse client base!

The Collective Purpose partner organisations have experienced some significant changes in staffing, farewelling some long-term staff and welcoming new faces! Dr. Peri O'Shea resigned as CEO of Being, after several years of fierce leadership. Peri was a critical player in the inception, development and implementation of the Collective Purpose project and we are forever grateful for her hard work in this space! Sage Green joined Being as Acting CEO for a number of months, playing a critical role in leading the team until the appointment of Being's new CEO, Irene Gallagher. Dr Nick O'Connor stepped down from the WayAhead Board and as Chair of the Collective Purpose Governance Committee. We thank Nick for his invaluable service in ensuring the effective governance of the Collective Purpose and welcome Sharyn McGee in her new role as Chair of the Governance Committee.

MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR



Collective Purpose has had an exciting year. This initiative of the three organisations has grown from strength to strength over the last year. We continue to collaborate and work well together within our shared office space.

Our marketing plan has seen many benefits already. In the last 12 months, we have attracted a diverse array of organisations to use our facilities on a regular or occasional basis, and we are close to being full in terms of desk hire. The hiring of our conference and meeting rooms by external groups has increased substantially from 2016 and also from our projected usage this year so far. Our financial position reflects these numbers and we are ahead of our projected budget position at this point.

There are challenges ahead as we continue to develop the Collective Purpose model. We will always need to work within the changing landscape of mental health. Following a review of Collective Purpose, the NSW Mental Health Commission has reinforced its support for our initiative and achievements.

Going forward into 2018 the next stage is to develop and foster a sustainable Shared Services model and our CEOs have begun consulting with experts in this field.

The Governance Committee will continue its role in monitoring and progressing our vision for Collective Purpose. Having recently taken on the role of chair, I want to thank our enthusiastic committee members, our committed CEOs, and our wonderful staff and volunteers who have worked very hard to make Collective Purpose an ongoing success. It is a privilege to be involved.

- Our 2016 yearly holiday collection was made in memory of our colleague and friend, Jean Mackay, and donated to three of her favourite charities. A total of \$360 was raised and donated in equal parts to Amnesty International Australia, the Asylum Seeker Resource Centre and Prince Fluffy Kareem
- \$1,117.50 was raised for the Cerebral Palsy Alliance Australia through the Step-Tember Campaign, with the four Collective Purpose teams recording a joint total of 2,280,999 steps!
- \$184 was raised in support of the Yes! Marriage Equality campaign through the sale of YES badges at Collective Purpose reception.
